Autumn term 2017: *A different light: How photography re-imagined the world*



A Different Light is a series of ten lectures exploring photography's historical engagements with the idea of the real. From its inception, photography was celebrated both for its scientific objectivity and for its capacity for invention, idealism, and visual fantasy. The photographic pioneers of the nineteenth century documented archaeological sites, Civil

War battlefields, and the working lives of the urban poor; others sought to establish the new medium as an art form, staging and photographing fictional scenes that reflected the classical conventions of *Salon* painting. In the twentieth century, and through to the present day, photographers have continued to play on this dual identity, exploring the tension between the apparent objective 'truth' of the photographic image and the photographer's subjective framing of their visual material.

The lecture series, presented by six of the UK's leading photographic historians, introduces the work of key practitioners, genres, and movements, in which the mythic objectivity of photography has been both exploited and challenged. Nineteenth-century topics include the American Civil War photography of Roger Fenton and Mathew Brady, Eadweard Muybridge's pioneering studies in human and animal movement, and the late Victorian craze for 'spirit photography'. The pictorialist movement in art photography is discussed, in terms of its self-conscious attempts to downplay and subvert the mechanical nature of the photographic medium. A further lecture, on art photography in the early twentieth century, describes the seminal photography of Eugène Atget, and the appropriation of his work by surrealist photographers in the interwar decades. We will hear about the revelatory visions of scientific photography, consider the critiques of photographic 'realism' in the work of feminist photographers such as Cindy Sherman, Martha Rosler, and Carrie Mae Weems and, finally, explore the vernacular realism of the twentieth-century American photographer and writer Walker Evans.
