Van Gogh | Exploring Self Drawing Activity

Devised by artist and Courtauld Educator Alexandra Blum

Don't stop now, draw a self-portrait!

Make the most of the skills you began to build during our workshop by drawing a self-portrait using the guide below.

Materials: Mirror or phone, pencil (4b is ideal but an ordinary HB pencil is fine too), A4 white cartridge paper, eraser, pencil sharpener

Timings: 50-60 minutes.

Mind set: Do not worry about whether the drawing looks like you, instead focus on observing the light on the surface of your face. Keep your mind neutral, rather than trying to express how you are feeling.

Setting up: You do not have to sit directly facing the mirror. If you prefer, try sitting at an angle instead. What happens if you are very close to the mirror, or further away?

Learning from Van Gogh: Think back to the variety of marks Van Gogh used. You can use a mixture of line, broader marks following the contours of the face, and patches of tone* to describe shapes which make up parts of individual features.

Light: As you draw, focus on the contrast between the light and dark areas on the surface of your face. It's useful to start your drawing with an area of mid-tone*, so that you can draw darker and lighter areas in relation to the first tone you drew. Consider layering marks to create the darkest areas and do not forget you can use the white of your paper as the lightest tone. As you draw, keep comparing the tone of the area you are drawing with surrounding areas. Ask yourself which is lighter or darker and adjust the drawing accordingly. Try creating the edge of a form without using an outline. Instead, create the boundary between one form and another purely through contrasting patches of tone.

Shape and form: Think in terms of straight lines, curves and diagonals instead of eye, nose, ear etc. Compare one form with another, to understand their relative positions. Remember how it felt to draw the contours of your face with the hand you do not usually draw with. Try to recreate that same level of focus on the surface of your face as you make this drawing. Allow the marks you make to follow the contours of your face, so that tone and form emerge simultaneously.

Tips: Start with a small area, you might want to begin with a single eye and move out from there. There is no need to be overwhelmed, just draw slowly, bit by bit and see how far you get. Notice how your drawing changes, pay attention to the aspects which surprise you. Stop when you discover something unexpected.

Next steps: Want to make more drawings? Try shorter, faster drawings of 20 minutes and longer drawings of 90 minutes. Which qualities emerge in each? Which do you find most interesting? Can you work out why? What happens if you draw at different times of day? For example, first thing in the morning or at the end of the day. Try turning your phone off and drawing the reflection you see of yourself in the black screen. How does that change the tone in your drawing? Experiment with using colour to find equivalents of the tones you see. Pay attention to the colours which jump into your head as you focus on the tone. Do not question your colour choices, just follow those intuitive suggestions.

*vocabulary: **tone** = light and dark areas, including the gradations between the darkest and lightest areas; **mid-tone** = the tone which is half way between the darkest and lightest area.

Uncover the true story behind Van Gogh's Self-Portrait with Bandaged Ear

Research activity

Vincent van Gogh's <u>Self Portrait with Bandaged Ear</u> captures one of the most famous moments in art history. But what really happened during that dark winter night in 1888?

We have compiled a variety of primary and secondary sources relating to this event. **Your task** is to carefully select the most reliable sources and carry out art-historical detective work in order to unearth the truth behind Van Gogh's famous *Self Portrait with Bandaged Ear* (1889) which is now in The Courtauld Gallery Collection.

You might like to use these points as a guide when analysing your sources:

- Date of source:
- Title of source:
- Where was the source first published?
- Is this a primary or a secondary source? (see <u>here</u> for a definition of each)
- Who wrote, researched or produced it?
- Is the article factual, or based on personal opinion?
- What evidence is used to back up their argument? Is this evidence reliable?
- Consider the date of your source has more recent research been carried out?

Consider - how reliable is each source?

Reputation	– reliable/unreliable source?
Ability to see	– does the source know what they are talking about?
Vested interest	– does the source have something to gain?
Expertise	– does the source demonstrate true expertise?
N eutrality	– is the source biased or unbiased?

Once you have decided which sources contain the most recent and/or reliable research you can then **draw your own conclusion**.

Points to consider:

Has your research changed the way you now view the painting? If so, how? Has your research changed the way you now view the artist? If so, how? What new information have you uncovered? What has your research taught you about the reliability of sources? How can you apply this approach to the subjects you study at school/college?
